Your Degree Pathway



A degree in Criminology requires the completion of 120 Credits and is typically completed over four academic years. Your courses will consist of Major, General Education, and Elective Courses.

First Year

First year will introduce you to the university environment, provide you with general education courses, and allow options for you to study courses aligned with your own interests.

Second Year

In your second year, you will focus on critical topics in the Criminology program.

Third Year

our third year will include more intensive explorations of selected topics within the major, as well as allow you to broaden your knowledge base by taking more courses outside Criminology.

Fourth Year

In your fourth and final year, you will focus on advanced topics in both Criminology and your other selected areas of interest.
