## Your Degree Pathway



A degree in English requires the completion of 90 Credits for a Bachelor's Degree (three years) or 120 Credits for an Honours Degree (four years). Your courses will consist of Major, General Education, and Elective Courses.

## First Year

First year will introduce you to the university environment, provide you with general education courses, and allow options for you to study courses aligned with your own interests.



English Courses: Introduction to Literary Studies, Intertextualities General Education Courses: Humanities, Social Sciences or Natural Sciences (for non-science students)

Elective Courses: Your choice of courses outside of English

## Second Year

In your second year, you will focus on the critical topics in the major areas of literary study.



English Courses: Theory Course (Gender or Literature Studies), Genre Course (Poetry, Prose, Drama + more), Canon Course (British Literature, Canadian Literature, World Literature, + more)

General Education Courses: Humanities, Social Sciences or Natural Sciences (for non-science students)

Elective Courses: Choose new subjects to explore or continue to develop skills from previous selections

## Third Year

Your third year in English will allow you to explore specific interests in the field.



English Course Options: Avant Garde Movements, Travel Literature, Shakespeare, English Romantics + many more

Elective Courses: Choose new subjects to explore or continue to develop skills from previous selections

## Fourth Year - -

In your fourth and final year, your courses in English will be designed to meet your specific interests, with your choice of studying either a single author, period, place or movement.



English Course Options: Visionary Literature, Canadian Graphic Novels, Arthurian Literature, Edgar Allen Poe, Virginia Woolf + many more

Elective Courses: These courses can include additional English courses or further courses of interest at the upper level
