

Your Degree Pathway



A degree in Geography requires the completion of 90 Credits for a Bachelor's Degree (three years) or 120 Credits for an Honours Degree (four years). Your courses will consist of Major, General Education, and Elective Courses.



In your second year, you will continue your development of the fundamentals in Geography.



Geography Course Options: Global Environmental Change, Statistical Analysis in Geography, Hydrosphere, Geoinformatics, Refugees and Migration + many more General Education Courses: Humanities, Social Sciences or Natural Sciences (for nonscience students)
